The Alternate Angle...on Risk Management

Two events this spring, one local to New Hampshire and one far away, demonstrate a tie between project risk and the unpredictable natural environment.

In March a spring rain created unexpected difficulty on the Interstate 93 widening project here in New Hampshire in the town of Windham. Engineers were expecting rainwater runoff during the project and put measures in place to deal with it. However, this rain storm event that flooded the North East was probably not on the list of risks. This event was something that fell far outside what was expected and was the trigger for some quick thinking to minimize the overflow of water from the project site into local streams and ponds. Tank trucks saved the day by removing the excess water on the site and minimizing the amount of overflow.

The volcanic eruption in Iceland, which closed air travel over Europe for days afterward, is the latest event with impact on both people and projects.

While teleconferencing can substitute for face to face meetings, more often meeting in person is best for working on difficult issues and gauging perceptions. Also, the increased reliance on a mobile workforce, especially for IT related projects, means travel disruptions hold up progress on projects that touch every part of the economy.

What about the task of project risk identification? One instinct may be to focus on what's well known to go wrong and how it affects project outcome. Typically these are issues such as a vendor who may be late delivering, software untried and risky, or the loss of key individuals on a project.

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The PMBOK discusses the tools and techniques for identifying and managing project risk. But the PMBOK also recognizes that techniques such as checklists can't be complete with absolutely every risk identified. Natural events like these might be on someone's checklist in an area affected by volcanoes, such as Alaska or parts of Indonesia, where eruptions occur and interfere with flying. Here in the northeast United States there's very low probability for chance of a volcano. But, the indirect effects of one are far more severe especially with an interconnected world as shown with the recent eruption in Iceland.

Heavy winter snowstorms are a regular occurrence in this part of the country. There's at least one every year that's memorable and after a few days of inconvenience business returns to running as it did before the storm. Other recent events such as two feet of snow in Washington D.C. during February, the recent rain deluge in New England during March, and now the unpredictable behavior of the volcano in Iceland all suggest the need to consider how natural events may directly or indirectly impact a project.

It looks like now is the time to take the wide view on what constitutes project risk as a result of natural events and develop the ability to respond. Whether it's carrying away water ready to overflow by truck, or flying back home the long way around the world, dealing with risk now seems to require creativity in overcoming obstacles that may occur naturally.

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
